Our Parent/Teacher Partnership

Schools build on the successful learning provided at home, by the parents. Parents and teachers working together in partnership will help a child achieve success. As parents, you are probably already doing many things to help your child move forward on their path to literacy. In our newsletters, I will be sharing with you some ways you can support your child's language development at home. This newsletter's highlight is on **Speaking and Listening**, in engagement with your child:

- Take every opportunity to talk with your child; responding to and reinforcing attempts to communicate
- Always show an interest in and value what your child says
- *Read to your child and talk about the story and the pictures*
- Provide a range of books with clear illustrations or photographs
- Talk about topics of mutual interest with the expectation that your child will listen
- Ask and answer questions
- Involve your child in conversations, plans and discussions in a variety of situations
- Encourage your child to listen and respond to others' opinions. Support your child in developing confidence to express his or her understanding and thoughts
- Provide an example of good listening and avoid responding with "Mmmm" or "Just a minute"
- Include children in some adult conversations so that they can hear adult language use.

Library News (from Mr. Justin)

The Library, also known as The Learning Commons, is an active learning hub. As a media center, the students have access to digital learning on Ipads and the desktop computers, through which we integrate ICT and information literacy skills in learning. The Year 1, 2 and 3 students are actively engaged in a learning toolkit, *ABRACADABRA (or Abra)*, which is a digital literacy platform we have introduced in Library lessons as well as in the homerooms, to supplement our Library inventory. with the username as your child's first name or middle name (*where the first name is shared by another student*) and the password as 123. We will have a parent login rolling out soon to enable you to monitor your child's progress.

Early literacy tool



Inquiry process



ABRACADABRA stands for **A** *Balanced Reading Approach for Children Always Designed to Achieve Best Results for All*. A highly interactive, early literacy web-based tool that supports beginning readers through dozens of engaging activities and digital stories. **ABRA** helps children in the early elementary years develop skills in phonological awareness, reading fluency, comprehension, and writing.

The link is also home to other tools, one of which is the *ISIS21*, which we are initiating to the Year 4 and 5 students. *ISIS-21* (Inquiry Strategies for the Information Society of the Twenty-First

Century) is a tool which develops foundational information literacy skills, including identifying, searching for, and appropriately using information. It teaches students strategies for effectively using Internet search tools, evaluating sources, synthesizing information and designing creative final products. This tool will be pivotal in assisting the Year 5 students in their Exhibition unit.

School Timings and Student Attendance

A large number of students are not meeting the day-to-day school regulations of times to arrive at and/or depart from school, and we request to help on this.

Chronic late arrival to school: Many students are arriving at school well after the bell at 7.40am and at the conclusion of the assembly, or even after classes have started for the day. This is very disruptive for both the student who is late and those already at school. If your child is often late for school, perhaps look at those situations that may impact him/her not being at school on time. Identify and address what you can do together to remedy the situation. For example, as the parent, you may plan a *wake-up-and-get-ready schedule* for arriving on time. This could involve listing the tasks your child must do by a certain time to

prepare for school. This will help with him/her taking on some responsibility as well as developing self-management skills.

Collecting your child after school: I have written previously about concerns regarding collecting your child after school each day. On Wednesdays and Thursdays, ALL the students who attend LAMDA (not attending the first session), or who are waiting for an older sibling to finish their enrichment activity or are waiting for their parent or driver to arrive, will be supervised in the outer room of the library. No student will be allowed to play unsupervised on any day during the week, so I am again requesting that you collect your child as soon as possible at the end of the school day.

School Attendance Matters

Every school day counts in a child's academic life. A missed school day is a lost opportunity for your child to learn, develop and grow. Research shows us that there is a relationship between student attendance and student achievement. It also shows us that the student-teacher relationship is the strongest factor in determining success for our students. Prolonged absences from school impacts greatly on even the best teacher's ability to provide learning opportunities for their students. Did you know that?

- There are usually 40 teaching weeks in the school year
- Missing 2 days each month, totaling 18 days, equals 10% of the school year
- Missing 6 days every term every year is the same as missing one whole school year
- 95% attendance sounds good, but means that your child is taking one day off a month
- Would you think it was acceptable if your teacher was not at school to teach your child for a week because he/she had gone on a holiday during the term?

As an Academy policy, students must attend school for more than 90% of the days in the academic year; no student should miss more than 18 school days throughout the year. Should this be the case, at the end of the year, academic progress will be evaluated to determine whether they can progress to the next year level.

Unexpected absence from school, due to illness or another unforeseen event, should be communicated by email to the school office as well as your child's Homeroom teacher by 8:00am on the day of absence. For such cases, teachers can provide your child with some of the work that has been missed.

Planned absence must be communicated to the Principal at least 5 days before the start date. For such requests for absence, we cannot always guarantee that ongoing class work will made available. Should circumstances mean that your child needs to leave Mombasa for a period of time, for longer than a month, we recommended that they attend another school in the new place in which they are staying. Please be sure to discuss such arrangements with the Junior School Vice-Principal or Principal at least a week prior to travelling.
