Junior School Assemblies

Teacher PYP Workshops

On 14th – 16th February 2015 all Junior School teachers took part in International Baccalaureate workshops. For the PYP we ran three workshops; Reading and Writing Through Inquiry, Bilingual and Multilingual Teaching and Learning and Making the PYP Happen in the Classroom. Our trainers came from Slovenia and Lebanon and we were delighted that Ms Khona Bhattacharjee, our Year 5 teacher and experienced workshop facilitator, led one of the workshops.



Teacher Preparation Programme

Since 9th January 2015 we have had four intern teachers with us at the Junior School, following an intensive 3 week Teacher Institute held at the Academy in November and December 2014. Titus Makunyi, Kepha Obiri, Fridah Gatwiri and Michael Muchilwa are qualified teachers from national universities and are here with us to develop their practices and understanding of the IB programme. They will be spending blocks of time in different year levels until the end of next year. Included with this letter is a short write-up to introduce them to you.

Inter-School Junior Athletics Championships

The school was proud to host its 9th annual Inter-School Junior Athletics Championships, on Saturday 28th February. This proved to be a long and hot morning running into the early hours of the afternoon! We were proud to have so many of our students participate and come to support their friends. They provided us with lots of exciting moments, not least the relays taking place at the end of the track events. As can be seen from the results below, AKAM did extremely well taking overall 1st place as well as 1st place in the Under 8 and Under 10 events.

Information on Conjunctivitis

There have been recent cases of students with conjunctivitis and I request that if your child has symptoms of the condition, s/he sees a doctor and remains at home until it has cleared. I would like to share with you some information which was sent to us by parents at the Academy, Dr. Vishwanatha N.Gokhale and Dr. Sandhya V.Gokhale of Lions Eye Hospital, Mombasa.

We as ophthalmologists are seeing quite a number of fresh cases of conjunctivitis each day. It appears to be a strain of virus that is causing a highly contagious and often a very severe form of conjunctivitis. We felt it would be wise to educate the community about the facts of this viral infection so that people can take measures to halt this rapidly spreading epidemic.

Viral conjunctivitis spreads primarily through fomites or objects contaminated by the virus from a patient, as the virus is present in the tears and discharge of patients. It starts with redness of eyes, gritty sensation, itching, pain, tearing and discharge. Some or all of these symptoms may be present. It is our observation that some forms of viral conjunctivitis are taking a long course of even up to 3 weeks.

Spread of infection can be controlled by taking certain measures.

- 1. Patients should avoid touching or cleaning their eyes with bare hands or fingers.
- 2. Preferably use a tissue to wipe the eyes and discard it immediately.
- 3. Patients should wash their hands every time they touch their eyes.
- 4. Patients should avoid using common towels.



- 5. Family members who are not yet affected should avoid rubbing or touching their eyes unnecessarily as the fingers may carry the virus.
- 6. Wash your hands frequently.
- 7. Avoid close contact with the patient.
- 8. Infants, elderly and patients operated should be extra careful.
- 9. When more than one member of the family is affected, it is safer to use separate sets of eye drops.
- 10. Infected patients should avoid swimming as it can facilitate spread of the disease to others.

Contrary to popular belief, conjunctivitis does not spread by looking into the eyes of an infected patient.

Please pass this information to all to prevent the spread of the disease.
