Skype . The questions were asked in turns and were close—ended as the answers were either yes or no.


Students used maps and time zones, latitude and longitude to find the places. It was an engaging session as all the students were curious




The Grade 1s went on a field trip to the Nehru Zoological Park on 6th November 2014 to Journey of learning!

The Grade 1s went on a field trip to the Nenru Zoological Park on our November 2014 to deepen and expand their learning outside the classroom environment. It was an ideal experience. As teachers we cherished many moments when students were able to reflect

and connect their past experience to the present. The first-hand learning experience made us understand that field trips are the best learning engagements to reveal, start or end the unit. To share the responsibility of children's learning, many parents also accompanied us for the field trip to show support and encouragement. We reached the zoo at 9:30 a.m. and started our journey on battery cars. It gave us a chance to speak about cars which run on batteries. We discussed the difference between the mode of transport we used for our journey to the zoo (bus) and battery cars. The first animal we saw at the zoo was an elephant named Asha. As the journey continued we came across different types of animals which come from different parts of the world and allowed us to discuss the concept of habitats and adaptation. Before going to the zoo, we had not spoken about nocturnal animals, so when we entered the nocturnal animals' tunnel it both surprised and startled the students and made them curious. Students also looked at various species of birds which can live from 25 to 40 years.

Overall it was a most engaging, inquiring and reflective trip for Grade1. It allowed them a better understanding of their most - awaited and exciting unit. It also gave them ample opportunities to further reflect on their trans-disciplinary skills and concepts.







#### SHADOW PUPPET SHOW

Students of Grade 3 inquired into an art form of Andhra Pradesh called 'Thollu bommalata' . They found out that 'Thollu bommalata' is a Telugu word which literally means the dance of puppets. 'Thollu' means skin and 'bommalata' means puppet dance. These life size puppets are translucent as they are made of thin leather. This art form is a unique combination of the craft of making the puppets and the performing art of puppetry. As the students investigated into the art form further they decided not only to create their own puppets but to perform a puppet show. Students divided themselves in groups, selected stories and some of them even wrote their own stories for the puppet show. The process started with writing scripts, identifying characters and making the puppets. Students rehearsed the dialogues with their puppet movements and

learnt their lines with expression and voice modulation to present an entertaining shadow puppet show in front of the junior school students and teachers

#### Transdisciplinary workshop

In the month of September I attended an 'over time' IB regional workshop. It was spread over three Saturdays and hosted by Oakridge International School, Sreenidhi International School and the Aga Khan Academy, Hyderabad.

Our workshop was facilitated by Ms Archana Prashar, who is the PYP coordinator at the AKA,H.

Before the workshop, I had some knowledge about transdisciplinary curriculum, but after the workshop, there was certainly much more clarity on transdisciplinary and interdisciplinary curriculum.

On the first day we got very excited while creating props with the help of newspapers in order to display as many learner profile attributes as possible. On day three we compared our school's scope and sequence curriculum documents with the Australian, American and UK curriculum. We realized that the IB scope and sequence that we follow is much more transdisciplinary in nature than the other curriculum. We had begun the workshop by arranging a few statements in the order of true, more true than false, more false than true and false. At the end of the session we rearranged the them based on the knowledge that we had gathered. Overall, it was an enjoyable learning experience for me. I acquired knowledge and have more confidence in applying the concept in a classroom environment.


For lunch, a lavish spread of burgers, pasta, ice cream and other sumptuous items were laid out. The students were overjoyed to find their most liked menu being served.



#### Junior school helps students

Thanks to the AKA,H junior school, at least

100 of an expected 500 underprivileged Muslim minority students from the old city - who dropped out of school for financial reasons – will now be able to take their 10th examination in June 2015.

The junior school's students as well as teachers from both schools, and administration staff generously donated more than 1 lakh rupees earlier this term towards a unique project that the AKA,H is involved with. The project, "Enabling Secondary Education and Employability for Outof-School Adolescents in Minority Slums of Hyderabad, Telangana, India" is being implemented by Mahita in partnership with the Aga Khan Foundation (India) and the AKA,H under "Partnership to Strengthen Innovation and Practice in Secondary Education (PSIPSE)".

The pilot programme will provide out-of-school adolescents with scholastic support as well as non-cognitive and vocational skills to prepare them to meet the challenges of adulthood from a position of strength. Additionally, youth in grades 11–12, who have already completed secondary certification, will receive vocational education to enhance their employability. Funding has also come from the MacArthur Foundation and Human Dignity Foundation.

AKA,H outreach Program Manager Mr. Rajan Thampi said nearly 500 Muslim minority students will be trained in eight centres in the old city of Hyderabad. He said this is a "second chance" at education for these students, who now dream about getting good jobs, such as becoming air hostesses, teachers, businesspeople, doctors etc.

"I can assure you that the contribution each one of you made will never go in vain," he said in a letter to the school community, and added in an interview that the money "definitely throws hope in students' lives."

The exams are one of the hurdles in the project which was successfully conquered. Mr. Thampi said the support provided by the Academy is all about "ultimately supporting fellow human beings."

Mahita program director Ramesh Sekhar Reddy. P also personally wrote the school to say Mahita is "continually inspired by the dedication and generosity of colleagues from (the) Aga Khan Academy and specifically the children studying (at) the academy (who) contributed a lot for this noble cause."

Mr. Thampi also thanked Head of Academy Dr. Geoffrey Fisher and his administration team, Outreach's Rupen Chande and Anthony Spicer for their support.
